Residents who do not demonstrate due care in the use of fire can expect a visit from Police. On behalf of the Shire's volunteer firefighters and Toodyay Police, please burn responsibly - we hope not be visiting your property any time soon!

Winter is also a great time to check and service your firefighting equipment. ## TOODYAY RECEIVES BLACK SPOT FUNDING

The Wheatbelt Shires of Chittering and Toodyay were recently awarded Federal Black Spot funding for projects in their respective Shires. In Toodyay a bend on Julimar Road near the intersection of Toodyay West Road in West Toodyay with significant crash history is to be re-aligned and the seal widened, with raised pavement markers and delineation.

The Safe System mantra to road improvement works acknowledges that while drivers will always make mistakes and cannot drive perfectly all the time, a person should not be killed or seriously injured as a result. The typical approach to roads and roadsides is to treat known black spots with road widening, improved sight lines, pavement marking and signage, and removing roadside hazards, thus reducing crash risk and making the roads safer for all.

The works are scheduled for the 2020-2021 Financial year and will be carried out by Local Government crews.

## SHIRE ROADS UPDATE



Down at the depot, works have been ramping up in order to complete the current financial years program prior to the wet season and to take advantage of the decreased traffic as a result of COVID-19. Several road improvement projects are either underway or about to commence across the Shire. Please ensure you follow traffic management advice and drive safely through any worksites. Our staff want to get home to their families at the end of the day too.

### Traffic Counts:

As you can imagine, traffic flows across the world have been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. While traffic volumes have dropped between 35-50% in areas, speeding fines have nearly doubled as drivers take more risks. It is important to remember that while the roads may be empty, speed limits are in place for your safety - the majority of accidents in Toodyay involve a single vehicle only.

### Dumbarton Bridge:

Bridge repair works unfortunately required the closure of Dumbarton Bridge in February and as a result a temporary bypass track was reinstated. Shire of Toodyay has worked closely with the Traditional Owners in an effort to restore the river bed and banks to a condition better than we found it. Works to remove a section of the causeway were completed in late April concluding with a traditional smoking ceremony. We wish to thank Rod, Paul and Allen Garlett for their advice and cooperation to ensure a positive outcome.

### Bejoording Road:

Shire of Toodyay crews are currently undertaking 3km of road reconstruction on Bejoording Road, between Sheen and Nunile Roads. Works involve vegetation pruning, widening, pavement rehabilitation and sealing. Asphalt works at the intersection of Nunile/Bejoording Road will look to ensure heavy vehicles can manoeuvre safely without causing ongoing maintenance issues.

### Bindi Bindi - Toodyay Road:

Road works on a 2.5km section of Bindi Bindi - Toodyay Road is scheduled to commence in May. Works will widen, repair and re-seal the section of road between Carroll Road and the Shire Boundary near Bolgart. Please allow for minor delays for the duration of the works.

### Hamersley Street:

For those who travel along Hamersley Street and the heavy vehicle bypass, it will come as a welcome relief to know that works are underway to rectify the harsh transition over the railway crossing after the tracks were raised last year. The project is being undertaken by a mix of Shire staff and contractors and will require a period of road closure at the time of asphalt works. Variable message boards will be in place advising of any upcoming traffic impacts.

### Bejoording Town Site intersection works:

Intersection improvement works are programmed to take place on five intersections within the Bejoording area. Gravel being pushed onto Bindi Bindi - Toodyay Road has been an ongoing maintenance issue. The proposed minor drainage works and sealing of the intersections will create a safer road environment for drivers.

### Dreyer Road:

At the completion of Bejoording Road, Shire crews will move to Dreyer Road to construct and seal 800m of road. Drainage improvement works will look to minimise the impact of runoff into properties that has long caused erosion issues in the area due to the steep terrain.

### Rosedale Street:

The intersection of Rosedale Street and Folewood Road will be closed off to all traffic as a result of ongoing illegal manoeuvres by members of the public. Works are programmed for this financial year and will be in consultation with local residents.

## WHATS COUNCIL BEEN UP TO THIS MONTH?

Council held four Special Meetings as well as the Ordinary Council Meeting in the month of April 2020.

Live streaming of these meetings was available to the community and we anticipate that the practice of live streaming will continue. The Shire appreciates the community's patience with the technical issues we have experienced while we embrace these new systems.

A special Meeting of Council held on 14 April 2020 was called to discuss and acknowledge the impact of COVID-19 on our community. Council voted to implement the following:

- Council will not increase any rates in the dollar for the 2020/21 financial year.
- Council resolved to implement any 2020 revaluations (either Unimproved or Gross Rental), which would normally be applied at 1 July 2020 and grant concessions on any increases to be in line with the 2019/2020 budgeted rates revenue.
- Council will not increase fees and charges in the 2020/21 financial year.
- Council will decrease its charges on overdue rates from the current 7.5% pa calculated daily, to 0%.
- Council will decrease its administration fee to be paid when paying by instalment from the current \$7.50 per instalment rate and the 3%pa interest charge (calculated daily) to \$0.00 per instalment rate and 0%pa interest charge.
- Council will decrease its administration fee to be paid when setting up a payment arrangement from the current \$40.00 to \$0.00 (nil).
- Council will offer a 3% discount to ratepayers who pay their 2020/21 rates in full by the due date instead of offering Rates Incentive Prizes in the 2020/2021 financial year.
- Council acknowledged that the effects of COVID-19 will have a significant and lasting financial impact on the Shire of Toodyay.
- Council will consider future financial relief measures available to it during its 2020/2021 Annual Budget deliberations.

### Items covered at the April Ordinary Council Meeting were as follows:

- Cr Manning resigned from the position of President and Cr Rosemary Madasci stepped down as Deputy President.
- Cr Rosemary Madasci and Cr Beth Ruthven were elected as President and Deputy President, respectively.
- Stan Scott finished his term as the Shire's CEO on 12 May 2020.
- Suzanne Haslehurst has been appointed as the new CEO for the Shire of Toodyay. It is anticipated Suzie will commence working with the Shire early August, if not before.
- Chiley Luangala, Manager of Corporate Services, was appointed Acting CEO by Council on 24 March 2020 and will continue in this role until the new CEO commences.
- A number of questions on behalf of the Toodyay Progress Association were asked and answered during public question time.
- A presentation was made to Council by the Toodyay Chamber of Commerce and Industry and Bendigo Bank regarding the Toodyay Dollar program.
- The monthly financial statements were received by Council.
- The monthly list of payments were received by Council
- Council adopted Policy F.22 COVID-19 Financial Hardship for new debts.
- Council established a Working Group to brainstorm ideas and develop strategies with the intention of bringing those ideas to Council for formal endorsement, subject to provision of local government resources. Members of the Working Group as follows: Cr Hart, Cr Rayner, Cr Greenway, Cr Madasci, and the Chief Executive Officer.
- Council accepted the recommendation that the Shire of Toodyay immediately adopt the National Code of Conduct for Commercial Leasing, which includes the requirement for the Shire of Toodyay, as landlord, to offer its tenants proportionate reductions in rent payable in the form of waivers and deferrals of up to 100% of the amount ordinarily payable based on the reduction in the tenant's trade during the COVID-19 pandemic period and a subsequent reasonable recovery period.
- Council voted against a recommendation for Councillor attendance fees to be suspended because of their reduced workload due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Council voted against a recommendation that, as part of its 2020/21 budget deliberations, Council consider issuing each household in the Shire of Toodyay with a minimum of \$100 Toodyay Dollars.
- Council voted to make the position of Manager Community Development redundant with the Community Services area moving to be overseen by the Manager Corporate & Community Services.

### Are you a livestock owner?

In Western Australia, owners of all cows, sheep, pigs, goats, horses, llamas and alpacas must be registered. Registration is required whether you're running a large cattle property, grazing a few sheep on a small landholding or you have a pet pig, goat or alpaca. Being able to trace livestock movement helps us manage disease outbreaks, boost consumer confidence in our livestock product and protect the health of the livestock industry. Whether your farm is big or small, all Western Australian livestock owners have a role in keeping our produce clean, safe and in-demand. Correct identification of cattle, sheep, pigs, goats and alpacas supports traceable produce, boosts consumer confidence, keeps the door open to business and enables disease management. In coming months the Shire of Toodyay will be conducting random registration inspections.



### Dog Attacks

Over the past weeks the Shire of Toodyay Rangers have found there to be an increasing number of dog attacks in the Shire. The Dog Act 1976 interprets an "attack" to be, aggressively rushing at or harassing any person or animal, biting or otherwise causing physical injury to a person or animal, tearing clothing on, or otherwise causing damage to the property of, the person attacked, attempting to attack, or behaving in such a manner toward a person as would cause a reasonable person to fear injury. As a dog owner, you are legally responsible for how your dog behaves. By managing your dog correctly, you can prevent it from attacking people and animals: Never allow your dog to wander unsupervised. Install secure fencing and regularly check it and when in any public place in Western Australia your dog must be tethered or on a leash, unless the place is a designated dog exercise area. As an owner, you are still completely responsible for the control and behaviour of your dog. Allowing your dog to wander puts its health at risk and can even endanger yours. Every year hundreds of pets are shot, poisoned and impounded for attacking people and livestock. Other roaming dogs die from snake bite or traffic accidents. Those that do return often bring back diseases that could be passed on to their owner's family or other pets. Rangers will not be giving out cautions in the event of a dog attack. As a dog owner you can be fined up to \$10,000, or even be charged with manslaughter, if your dog attacks. A dog attack is traumatic for both the victim and the dog owner, but most can be avoided if dog owners properly manage their pets. If you, or someone you observe, are threatened or attacked by dogs, contact the ranger. If serious or life threatening injuries are sustained call 000 or seek the required medical attention.

### How does your street look?

We all tend to walk or drive around and not see things that are obvious to another person looking with "fresh eyes". Next time you go for a drive or walk around town, take time to observe what a visitor might see when they are in Toodyay. Are the roads in good order? Have any guide posts been knocked over? Are the garden beds weed free? Are the facilities clean and in working order? The Shire needs your help! We can't be everywhere and do everything at once, but if we don't know we can't change things. 



### FREE training course for all hospitality staff on COVID-19 hygiene

On Sunday, 10 May 2020 Mark McGowan announced an easing of restrictions. As of Monday, 18 May 2020 cafes and restaurants reopened for dine in meals, the Western Australian Government want them to be as clean and safe as possible. That's why they will now fund a new FREE training course for all hospitality staff on COVID-19 hygiene.

The outbreak of the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) has changed the way that we live and work. Western Australia has managed the virus outbreak very well, and as WA's hospitality and tourism businesses re-open, they will need to have new hygiene practices in place.

Workers in the hospitality and tourism industry have a role in supporting safe and healthy venues and practices. The AHA Hospitality & Tourism COVID-19 Hygiene Course has been backed by the Western Australian Government and is designed to provide you with hygiene awareness and procedures.

This course will cover the following modules:

- Understanding COVID-19 and the WA Hospitality & Tourism Industry
- Reporting of personal health issues
- Maintaining personal and work environment hygiene practices
- Contactless procedures and reducing cross contamination
- Effective cleaning and sanitising practices

### NBN Co creates \$150 million COVID-19 Relief and Assistance

NBN Co has announced it will establish a \$150 million financial relief and assistance fund to help internet providers to support their residential and small and medium business customers affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The relief fund, created following a short industry consultation led by NBN Co, is aimed at helping internet providers connect low-income households with home schooling needs, supporting emergency and essential services, and assisting small and medium businesses and residential customers who are facing financial hardship.

The consultation involved more than 50 internet providers, government and consumer group Australian Communications Consumer Action Network (ACCAN) and identified specific customer segments that require immediate support.



Shire of Toodyay residents will be pleased to know that as of Monday, 18 May 2020, our Offices reopened to the public. This includes the Administration Office, Visitors Centre and Library, with the Museums opening in Phase 3. These are hopefully the first of several steps in the next few weeks as the State Government gradually lifts restrictions and allows WA residents to begin returning to a more normal state of reality.



Certain restrictions will remain in place for the time being these will include:

- The number of people that may enter our facilities at a given time - 1 person per 4m<sup>2</sup> rule that will remain in place. Please take note of any signage and floor markings.
- Hand sanitiser will continue to be provided and visitors to the facilities are encouraged to make use of it.
- We will also continue to have rope barriers in place at the Administration Centre to ensure the 1.5m social distancing is observed between visitors and Shire staff.
- We prefer you to use 'tap & go' still instead of cash.
- If you are unwell, please do not visit us.

Other Shire services and facilities that have been closed or cancelled in recent weeks due to the COVID-19 Pandemic remain closed or unavailable for the time being. This includes playgrounds and skate parks and Museums. As soon as these services are permitted to resume by the State Government, the Shire will re-open them and advise the public accordingly.

To effectively help contain any outbreaks of Coronavirus and in lifting current restrictions, the Federal Government created an app that can be downloaded onto your smart phone.

The idea is that the more people who download the app, the fewer places the virus will have to hide. In turn, this keeps you, your family and your community safer and we can get back to business and back to enjoying our lives sooner.

The Federal Government's COVIDSafe app works by finding close contacts of COVID-19 cases and helping state and territory health officials to quickly contact people who may have been exposed to COVID-19. All you need to do is turn on Bluetooth on your phone and keep the app running as you go about your daily business. **Phase 1** 27 April 2020

- Gatherings limit raised from 2 to 10 people
- Some additional non-contact public activities permitted
- Soft start to Term 2 for public schools introduced
- Home opens permitted in accordance with the limit on gatherings
- Weddings and funerals, up to 10 people
- Outdoor personal training (no shared equipment) up to 10 people

**Phase 2** 18 May 2020

- Non-work gatherings limit raised to 20 people
- Weddings and funerals up to 20 people inside or 30 outside
- People are encouraged to return to work, unless they are unwell or vulnerable
- Regional travel restrictions relaxed, travel permitted between:
  1. Perth, Peel, Wheatbelt, South West & Great Southern
  2. Mid-West, Gascoyne & Pilbara\*
  3. Within the Goldfields-Esperance region\*
  4. Local Government Areas in the Kimberley\*
- Public pools permitted to open with strict rules
- Cafes and restaurants permitted to reopen with meal service, including within pubs, bars, clubs, hotels and casino, up to 20 patrons, with the 4sqm rule applied
- Places of worship, libraries, community centres & community facilities may reopen, with a 20 patron limit
- Indoor and outdoor fitness and dance classes allowed, with a 20 participant limit, minimal shared equipment and 4sqm rule applied
- Non-contact community sport and training allowed, with a 20 person limit

**Phase 3** Around 4 weeks after Phase 2

- Further increases in non-work gatherings
- Contact community sport
- Beauty therapy services
- Public playgrounds, skate parks, cinemas and concert venues

Phase 3 will be subject to health advice, but will focus on continuing to build stronger links within the community and include further resumption of commercial and recreational activities. It may include:

- Further increase to non-work gathering limits
- Reopening playgrounds, skate parks and outdoor gym equipment
- Reopening galleries, museums, zoos, theatres, cinemas and concert venues
- Resuming beauty therapy and personal care services
- Resuming community contact sport
- Restrictions further relaxed for gyms, health clubs and indoor sport centres
- Reopening auction houses and real estate auctions
- Possible further adjustments to regional boundaries

**Phase 4** Future easing of restrictions will be determined and occur in line with expert health advice

**1.5m** Avoid close contact with others. Keep at least 1.5 metres away.

**Healthy hygiene** Wash your hands regularly. Cover your mouth/nose when you cough/sneeze.

**4 square metres per person** (1m x 1m)
