

Burning Restrictions/Prohibitions...

Residents are reminded that we are now in the fire season. Subject to season variation, the Shire will be in the **Restricted Burning Period** for the remainder of **October**.

This means permits are required for burning operations. Permits may be applied for via the Shire's website <http://www.toodyay.wa.gov.au/Resident-Services/Fire-Information/Fire-restrictions-and-permits>. Any permit issued will carry conditions which must be fully complied with.

RESTRICTED 1 October - 31 October Annually Permit Required	Subject to season variation, the Shire enters the Prohibited Burning Period on Friday, 1 November .
PROHIBITED 1 November - 8 March Annually No Burning	No burning is permitted after this date. 1 November is also the due date for compliance with the Shire's Fire-break Notice which sets out owner/occupier legal responsibility in preparing/maintaining their property under Section 33 of the <i>Bush Fires Act 1954</i> . Inspections are conducted and penalties apply. The Fire-Break Notice was mailed out with the rates notice, it may also be viewed in on the Shire's website.
RESTRICTED 9 March - 30 April Annually Permit Required	
OTHER TIMES Restrictions may apply outside the above periods including days of VERY HIGH fire danger or above

As President of the Shire of Toodyay, I would sincerely like thank Councillors Judy Dow, Eric Twine and Rob Welbum for their dedicated service to the Community over the past four years.

The Recreation Precinct is well under way, with huge machines and many tonnes of material being dug up and moved to other areas of the site. To date a small amount of rock has been broken and moved to a holding area for future use. Roll on August/September 2020 for an official opening of our aquatic centre and sporting fields.

The work on the Duke Street Foot Bridge commenced in September and we expect the project to be completed prior to Christmas.

Also the work on Newcastle Goal, (our Toodyay Museum) has commenced. The project is over three stages, the cell block is the first with new timber bearers and new Shingles on the roof. The Courthouse area is the second stage and the entrance to the building being the final stage.

The Coondle Nunile Fire Brigade building is well under way and we look forward to that brigade having their vehicles operational from this location in the coming fire season.

TOODYAY TREE AND UNDERSTOREY SCHEME

Toodyay Seed group is a sub group of Toodyay Friends of the River and we grow native plants for private landholders and community groups to undertake revegetation projects around the shire. Our group operates from the community shade house area at the Toodyay junction on Railway Road.

Toodyay residents can get an application form by emailing Bethan on bethanlloyd_8@msn.com or pick one up from shire outlets such as the Administration Office, Visitor Centre and the Library.

If you give us information about your project site we can select the correct species for you. We collect and sow seed through the summer months and plants are distributed at end of May early June each year.

So get your orders in before the end of November to ensure you get what you need.

Plants are in 50 mm tubes and are \$1 each for private landholders and free for community groups. Occasionally we have larger plants of some species such as eremophilas.

MUSEUM AND HERITAGE - 1907 lock-up

At the far end of the Newcastle Police Stables block is the 1907 lock-up. The lock-up was constructed by local builder Morgan Ford for £450 and was situated behind the Police Residence on Duke Street.

The lock-up is of a very different design to the Newcastle Gaol, it replaced and catered for both men and women. Inside are two male cells and a single female cell, with two separate exercise yards. The male exercise yard, is (not surprisingly) twice as big as that of the female yard.

There are iron brackets near the top of the walls of the male exercise yard, indicating a mesh covering was originally in place to stop prisoners from scaling the walls and dropping over the other side to freedom.

A wooden thunderbox with nightsoil pan access is still present in the women's yard. At some point plumbing was installed in the men's side, although all the fittings have now been removed.

The building was used for short term confinement before people were brought before a magistrate and remained in use until 1967 when new police facilities on Stirling Terrace were opened.

While the Newcastle Gaol is partially or fully closed during restoration work in 2019/2020 the men's section of the 1907 lock-up (at the Stables end of the building) is being opened for the public to view. One cell has been cleared and a law and order display has been installed.

Once the restoration of the Newcastle Gaol is completed the lock-up will once again be closed for public access. However, in the long term, it is envisaged this building will be able to be opened more often as a part of our museum precinct.



TOODYAY GOLF CLUB INC.

The Toodyay Golf Club was established in 1913 and had their 100 year anniversary in 2013. Golf was played in several other locations until 1979, when it was moved to its present location, after purchasing the land in 1976 with Shire assistance. The course is situated behind the race course where golf was played for several years. The clubhouse was still at the race course until 1985 when the present clubhouse was opened.

The golf season runs from May until early October with the men playing on Sundays and the occasional Saturday for special events. **Men's Captain is Adam Pearce phone 0427252417.**

Visitors Centre News



On 25 September the Visitors Centre held a sundowner for our partners which was a great opportunity for The Visitors Centre staff and businesses to catch up to do some networking. A PowerPoint presentation showcased what the team at the Visitors Centre do to promote Toodyay, its businesses and events.

On 26 September the Beverley CRC toured some of the Avon Valley Visitor Centres starting in Bindoon/Chittering and making their way through Toodyay, Northam and York. The group of 12 consisted of Beverley CRC, Beverley Visitor Centre staff, volunteers and the Shire of Beverley tourism staff. They arrived at the Toodyay Visitors Centre at 11am and stayed until 1pm, first chatting with Visitors Centre staff then exploring Connors Mill followed by a wander down Stirling Tce to see just what Toodyay has to offer.



Wildflower season has brought an influx of visitors into town with most weekends having over 200 people through the Visitors Centre doors on both Saturdays and Sundays and approx. 100 visitors each week day.

NO ESCAPE! Moondyne Festival in danger of permanent incarceration!

Toodyay's much-loved Moondyne Festival will be not held in 2020 if additional volunteers do not step forward to join the current working group.

The Annual General Meeting for Toodyay Events Planning Inc. (TEPI) – Moondyne's management committee – and the AGM for Toodyay Music Festival Inc. (TMFI) were held sequentially at the Freemasons Hotel on Monday, 16 September. Despite the call for volunteers over the last few months, the turnout at these meetings was pitifully low.

Elections were held to fill the committee officers' posts that had become vacant, both festivals are in need of a secretary as of now.

The Moondyne Working Group currently consists of only one person (the Project Coordinator) and is in need of a dozen volunteers – people needed for:

- ⇒ Project Coordinator – filled for 2020 only
- ⇒ Secretary
- ⇒ Treasurer
- ⇒ Stallholders - General
- ⇒ Stallholders - Food
- ⇒ Entertainment
- ⇒ Advertising
- ⇒ Street Theatre – Filled
- ⇒ Costumes & Costume maintenance
- ⇒ Logistics & Property



In other words, an entire working group willing to keep this hugely popular event alive – so people power has never been more important. Dedicated volunteers are a significant reason why the Music Festival's future is looking bright in spite of its unfortunate cancellation this year. A strong and proactive team working behind the scenes means the event is back on track for 2020, with plans already in place.

Both Festivals need coordinators for 2021 otherwise they will not happen. By contrast, while this year's Moondyne proved one of the more successful events of recent years, the number of volunteers on the Working Group was at an all-time low. There is an event coordinator in place for Moondyne 2020, but unless more volunteers join the Working Group by mid-October, Moondyne Joe won't escape gaol and make it to Toodyay next May.

Festivals like Moondyne are part of Toodyay's 'life blood', offering enjoyment to residents and tourists alike and providing significant trading benefits for many local businesses. Moondyne has been held for many years, the Music Festival for fewer – but both have developed event databases and working systems that allow their respective Working Groups to ensure each event runs like a well-oiled machine on the day.

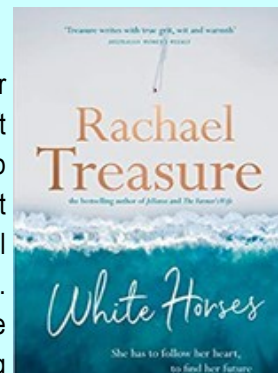


Toodyay Library Talk – September 2019

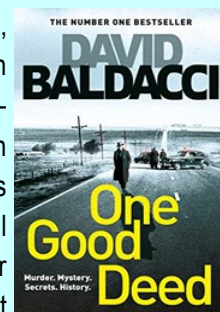

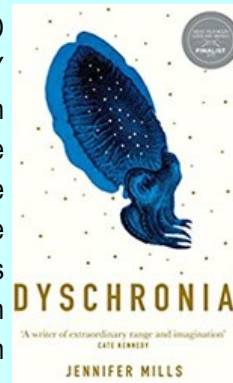

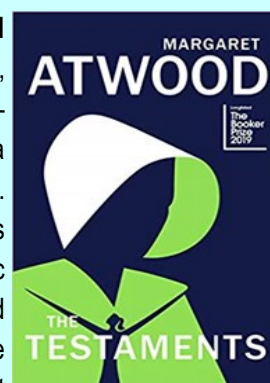
***Dyschronia*, Jennifer Mills** SHORTLISTED

The Shire of Toodyay has also decided to wait until after the Council elections on 19 October 2019 so that the new Council will be able to be in place for its final adoption. We anticipate that the draft Scheme will be available for comment in November.

Local Planning Policy Development

The Shire of Toodyay administration is currently working on the creation and review of a number of its Local Planning Policies. Two key policy areas currently being addressed are a new Extractive Industry policy and a revised policy on Outbuildings and Sheds.

The development of this Extractive Industry policy will adopt a best practice approach. We are currently researching examples of such policies elsewhere and looking how they address matters such as road maintenance, rehabilitation and also model conditions. We recently met with other local government representatives and the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage, where amongst other matters, the possibility of developing a set of model Extractive Industry conditions was discussed.

The overall intent of this policy is to provide consistency and certainty to both the community and the extractive industry operators – with the aim to make the Shire’s process and policy the benchmark to be compared to in the future.

The Outbuilding and Sheds local planning policy is being developed to provide a more consistent framework for the assessment and

regulation of sheds and outbuildings in the Shire of Toodyay. Currently the only planning policy speaks to Outbuildings in Residential zoned land (Residential, Residential Development and Special Residential). It is hoped that the new policy will address the development of sheds and outbuildings across all zones. Specifically it will address the processes for an Outbuilding before a dwelling and how and when this can be considered – along with a set of standard approval conditions.

Both of these policies are anticipated to go to Council in November after which they will be undergoing a period of public consultation.

Government Sewerage Policy (2019)

The State Government's 'Government Sewerage Policy (2019)' became operational on 23 September 2019. The policy guides future strategic planning, subdivision and development for the provision of sewage disposal in Western Australia. The policy promotes reticulated sewerage as the best disposal method for sewage. It requires all new subdivision and development to be connected to reticulated sewerage where available or considered necessary on health, environment or planning grounds. Where reticulated sewerage cannot be provided, the policy provides detailed site requirements for on-site sewage treatment and disposal. - a ballot paper envelope with an elector's certificate attached; and
- a postage pre-paid envelope addressed to the Returning Officer.

If any of these papers are missing from your package please contact the Western Australian Electoral Commission.

How to Vote

Instructions on 'How to Vote' are on the ballot paper. It is important to read and follow these instructions carefully to ensure your vote counts.

Your Vote is Secret

The elector's certificate with your personal details will be detached from your ballot paper envelope before it is opened. Elector's certificates and ballot papers are processed by Independent officers of the Western Australian Electoral Commission. For your vote to be counted, you must sign the certificate attached to the ballot paper envelope.

Replacement Packages

If you make a mistake in marking your ballot paper(s) or misplace any of your papers, you can obtain replacements at your local government office.

DID YOU KNOW?


During the 2018/2019 financial year, 150 Building Permits were issued within the Shire. There were a number of categories under which these permits were issued.

Some of those categories were:

outbuildings (40), Patios (19), water tanks (8) and single dwellings (20).

The total value of works approved was \$9,472,611.00 which is \$6,605,549 less than the 2017/2018 financial year total value of \$16,078,160.

Moorditj Yaakiny (Standing Strong) Project (MYP)

This project is delivered through the Regional Development Australia (RDA) Wheatbelt Inc 'Noongar Enterprise Development Support' projects and funded through the Australian Government Department of Social Services 'Inclusive Communities' grant.

The role of the MYP is to combine the assets, skills and opportunities of a community in developing community and individual entrepreneurship. A key component of this is the proactive identification of opportunity, the engagement with individual families and the development of forward pathways involving education, mentorship, connection with markets and existing advisor programs that can support the success and longevity of Aboriginal entrepreneurs.

"Standing Strong on Ballardong"

The MYP dedicated Project Officer in the Ballardong region is Robert Miles. It is Robert's role to encourage and support social enterprise and small Aboriginal business, this will also provide a mechanism for the delivery of other funded programs into the Wheatbelt. Ultimately a focus in this area is expected to generate services that will create a supportive environment for Aboriginal business, increasing economic activity and employment.

Through the MYP and the creation of social enterprises to act as incubation hubs, aimed at stimulating and assisting with the development of micro enterprise, it is expected to improve confidence, experience and commercial knowledge within the community and individuals.


The key element of this project is the building of capacity within the community to enable the MYP to continue over the long term from within the community.

It is our aim that on completion of the project ownership may transfer to Ballardong Noongar Corporations as they become established and the capacity to provide governance and support increases.
