# **Shire of Toodyay Fire-Break Notice**

Pursuant to Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954, all residents and ratepayers within the Shire of Toodyay are required to comply with the requirements set out in this notice

**Due Date:** 1 November Annually Maintained Until: 30 April Annually

**NB**: If you purchase land during this period you have 14 days from purchase to comply with this order.

Failure to comply may result in a fine or prosecution

### 1. All land less than or equal to 1 hectare

- 1.1 All land with an area less than 1 hectare (2.47 acres) are reguired to be fire hazard reduced by ensuring:
  - grass height does not exceed 100mm; and
  - no tree crowns overhang the building; and
  - Total available fuel load is maintained at 2 tonnes per hectare or lower.

### 2. All land greater than 1 hectare

2.1 Land up to and including 200 hectares in size shall have a rials 3 metres horizontally (wide) and 4 metres vertically (high).

fire-break cleared and maintained within 10 metres of the external

2.2 Land exceeding 200 hectares in size shall have fire-breaks cleared and maintained so as to divide the property into parcels of land less than 200 hectares.

2.3 A fire-break shall be cleared and maintained within 15 metres from external walls of buildings and around haystacks, solar panels and fuel storage areas.

2.4 A 20 metre wide Asset Protection Zone (low fuel area) shall be maintained from external walls of buildings and around haystacks, fuel storage areas such that:

- grass height does not exceed 100mm; and
- no tree crowns overhang the building; and
- Total available fuel load is maintained at 2 tonnes per hec-

2.5 A fire-break shall be cleared and maintained immediately surrounding a stationary motor.

**DEFINITION:** Fire-break – An area cleared of all inflammable mate-

Additional Restrictions during the Limited Burning Times: Pursuant to Section 24G(2) and Section 25(1a) of the Bush Fires Act 1954 and applicable to all persons, the burning of garden refuse and lighting of camping or cooking fires is prohibited within the Local Government district of Toodyay during the Prohibited Burning Period. Furthermore, pursuant to Section 24G(2) of the Bush Fires Act 1954 and applicable to all persons, the burning of garden refuse is prohibited within the Local Government district of Toodyay during the Restricted Burning Period unless a valid permit to burn has been obtained from a Fire Control Officer. Section 24C (Terms Used) of the Bush Fires Act 1954 contains definitions relevant to this notice.

Carrying of Fire Extinguishers during the Limited Burning Times: Pursuant to Section 27(3) of the Bush Fires Act 1954, and applicable to all persons, the Shire of Toodyay prohibits the operation of any tractor or self-propelled harvester without a fire extinguisher being carried within in the Local government district of Toodyay during the Restricted Burning Period and Prohibited Burning Period. Section 27(5) of Bush Fires Act 1954 and regulations 3 and 37(2) of the Bush Fire Regulations 1954 contain definitions relevant to this notice.

Shire of Toodyay Bush Fire Control Officers: Pursuant to Section 38 of the Bush Fires Act 1954, the Shire of Toodyay advises appointment of the following persons as Bushfire Control Officers for the Shire of Toodyay.

# DRAFT LOCAL PLANNING SCHEME NO. 5

The Shire of Toodyay invites submissions on the Draft Local Planning Scheme No. 5.

The Shire of Toodyay Local Planning Strategy (LPS) was endorsed by the Western Australian Planning Commission on 22 June 2018. A key recommendation of the LPS that the Shire develops a new local planning scheme to provide regulation of land use and development of land within the Shire.

At the Ordinary Council Meeting held on 28 August 2018, the Council of the Shire of Toodyay adopted for the purpose of advertising draft Local Planning Scheme No. 5. The Shire has now received consent from the Environmental Protection Authority to formally advertise its Draft Local Planning Scheme No.5 for public comment.

Formal advertising will occur between 2 September 2020 and 2 **December 2020** in accordance with the *Planning and Development* (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015. Plans and documents that set out and explain draft Local Planning Scheme No. 5 are available for inspection and can be found:

The Service was followed by a gathering at the new RSL headguarters in Toodyay - just over the road from ANZAC Park.














# Beautiful to look at but please don't pick!

# A Message from the Shire President.....

Spring is upon us and Toodyay is showcasing her best face, sunny with acacia and canola blossom, vibrant green rolling hills, frisky lambs and beautiful weather. Toodyay is busy with visitors as most know from the busy weekend traffic and we can anticipate many more following Toodyay's exposure in the RAC Special WA Travel Edition of Horizons, a circulation of 635,000 households.

If you have not already, wander past the Toodyay Recreation Centre and be inspired by an excellent facility in a such a lovely location. Not many regional schools have facilities like these at the back door and anticipation rises with the countdown to the official opening on 21 November. Then take a moment to consider the planning and work behind the scenes of life in Toodyay. Everything you do has a planning underlay, whether its parking, building, keeping livestock or pets, planning provides order and facilities

Currently two documents are open for comment, a Public Art Policy, closes on 16 September and the key document that most affects your lives, Toodyay's Local Planning Scheme draft version (No.5) closing on 2 December 2020.

Planning is a large, all encompassing and heavily regulated field for Shire officers and Council to navigate. Essential to success in meeting community expectation is the level of community input. Positive or negative, it provides the Shire an understanding of what is required and how best it can be delivered.

Subdivision is one area where misconceptions often occur. Subdivision approvals are undertaken by the WA Planning Commission (WAPC) with the role of local government simply to comment upon the conditions referred to it by the WAPC in the context of its local planning scheme and policies. The Shire responses to the WAPC are considered, yet may be overridden in the final decision.

So, before you skim past and delegate to the 'too hard basket', stop and consider what impacts most upon you. Then respond. Open the document on the Shire website under Open for Comment and read those areas and send in your comments clearly labelled as a submission for the draft Local Planning Scheme No.5.

We all have a part to play in how our community develops and the standard of life we wish to live, help direct our future.

# WHATS COUNCIL BEEN **UP TO THIS MONTH?**

The August Ordinary Council Meeting opened with Councilor's disclosing

Pursuant to Regulation 11 of the Local Government (Rules of Conduct) Regulations 2007: Cr Ruthven declared an Impartiality Interest in regard to Agenda Item 14.1 Bushfire Mitigation Works Program Tender; and Cr Madacsi declared an Impartiality Interest in regard to Agenda Item 9.2.3 EOI Audit Committee; and pursuant to Section 5.60A of the Local Government Act 1995: Cr Rayner declared a Financial Interest in regard to Agenda Item 14.2 Appointment of Bush Fire Control Officers.

During Public Question time, B Foley on behalf of the Toodyay Progress Association asked three questions relating to the management of the Toodyay Recreation Centre. All questions were responded to.

Minutes of the Ordinary Council Meeting held on 28 July 2020, Minutes from the Special Council Meeting held on 11 August 2020; Notes from the Agenda Briefing held on 18 August 2020 and Item 9.1.3 Proposed Road Name - Cascade Lane - were all adopted by exception.

B Foley made a submission to Council on behalf of the Friends of the Catholic Precinct regarding the proposed demolition of Appian Way.

An alternate Officer Recommendation saw Council refuse the application for Development Approval for the partial demolition of the covered walkway (known as Appian Way) at the Catholic Precinct.

Council recommended to the Geographical Names Committee that the new road created as a part of the Catholic Church Precinct subdivision be named Mercy Retreat. (Councillors Madacsi, Ruthven, Hart, Pearce and Rayner voted for the motion. Councillors Bell and McKeown voted against the motion).

Council recommended to the Geographical Names Committee that the new private road forming common property as a part of the Catholic Church subdivision be named Cascade Lane.

The List of Payments and Monthly Financials were not available due to the changeover of Enterprise Software and these will be brough to the September 2020 OCM.

Council appointed Mr Andrew McCann as a member of the Audit Committee.

Council requested the Chief Executive Officer to undertake a comprehensive review of the Shire's policies and delegations and bring all proposed, new or amended policies and/or delegations to Council for approval.

Council requested the Chief Executive Officer to review the Shire's procurement policies, practices and procedures in accordance with the recommendation made by the Auditor General and present a report to the December 2020 meeting of the Audit and Risk Committee for consideration of any recommended improvements to be made.

Council nominated voting delegates for the 2020 WALGA AGM as follows: Voting Delegate (1) Councillor Madacsi; Voting Delegate (2) Councillor Ruthven; and Proxy Voting Delegate (1) Councillor Rayner.

Council appointed Cr Hart as Primary Delegate and Cr McKeown as Deputy Delegate on the Museum Advisory Committee.

Council considered Item 13.2.1 Response to WALGA position on Final Report of the Local Government Review Panel as new business of an urgent nature and included the report in the meeting. Council then endorsed the feedback to WALGA's response to the Local Government Review Panel Final Report. 2. Council reports to WALGA that recommendation 53 (a) and (b) requires more clarification; and 3. Requested the Chief Executive Officer to submit the feedback to WALGA and the Zone on behalf of Council no later than Friday 28 August 2020.

Council Awarded tender TEN05-2020 as follows: Treatments in the Fuel Reduction - Prescribed Burning and Fuel Reduction Mechanical Works categories to Fire Mitigation Services Pty Ltd - value \$328,950.00; and Treatments in the Fire Access (Tracks) - Mechanical category to Avon Earthworks Pty Ltd for - value \$118,856.27.

Council received an excerpt of the minutes of the Bush Fire Advisory Committee (BFAC) held on 4 August 2020 and then considered BFAC Recommendations in respect to appointment of Bush Fire Control Officers and the designation of Chief and Deputy Chief Bush Fire Control Officer roles:






### Membership

Life is naturally sweet at the Julimar Date Garden, a one-off fruit farm turned tourist attraction right on Toodyay's doorstep. It has been to discover in their own backvard.

wealth of wildflowers and wildlife, it's an idyllic slice of agriculture on the surface. But underneath it's a booming business venture paving the path for date growing Down Under, as both the birthplace of commercial date harvesting in Western Australia and a pioneer of the Toodyay Food and Picnic Trail (a self-drive tour suggesting additional stops at the butcher, the baker and the Coorinja wine maker). At this Garden visits and tasting sessions are currently by appointment only, point, you must be wondering why you hadn't heard of it before.

Well, it's word of mouth over marketing that has made sure Stephen's produce - five different date varieties, including several previously unavailable in Australia - sells itself. And that word has spread way beyond the Wheatbelt. People travel to Toodyay from as far as Perth's southern suburbs just for a kilo of Julimar Medjools, bypassing countless supermarkets stocked with the imported kind. And they can all, Stephen is confident, taste the difference.

You can trust a man who worked as an aircraft engineer, police sergeant and prison officer prior to adding 'date grower' to his resumé. It was actually Stephen's police stint in the Northern Territory, and the fateful find of a date plantation in Alice Springs, that saw the garden's seeds sprout in his mind. He and his wife moved to WA and became Toodyay landowners in 2005, but two years of propertyprepping and decision-making followed before he finally swapped The garden is located at 1790 Julimar Road. incidents that landed him in hospital are the proof in the sticky date pudding. Luckily, passion is an effective painkiller).

sitting pretty on the southern edge of the Julimar State Forest, just 15 Patience is a must-have for any date farmer, since it can take the minutes from town, since owner/operator Stephen Kelly planted the trees up to a decade to produce the harvestable - and most first palm back in 2007 - yet it's something locals are often surprised importantly, edible - sweet treats. Stephen may have planted the garden's first palms thirteen years ago, but it wasn't until 2016 that he Fronting a 54-acre property surrounded by rolling hills and home to a saw the fruits of his labour in the flesh. Nowadays, after years of careful cultivation, his plantation's 115 palms produce a tonne of Medjool, Khadrawy, Khalas, Nagal and Barhee dates each year throughout summer and autumn. Stephen's pick of the bunch is the Khadrawy, but he finds the fruit-salad flavour of the Khalas very hard to resist. In the near future, it will be easier to see why for yourself.

> season and supply permitting (the dates are so in demand, you'll need your name on a list to have a hope of taking some home). But wait a little while and you'll be able to stop by a Bedouin-style "cellar door" featuring a tasting space, shop front and sorting room; and meet and greet camels direct from Morangup's Dromedairy, who might just be dressed up for the occasion. Both additions are bound to maximise the farm's Middle Eastern mystique and make every visit even more enjoyable.

> But why wait? The Julimar Date Garden is already well worth a visit, should you prefer sweet dates to sour grapes (over buying supermarket Mediools when you had a fresh, organic supply within a stone's throw). If you can picture yourself wandering through the plantation with a passionate and knowledgeable grower as your guide, give Stephen a call and he'll happily make a "date" with you.
